### Introduction

The City of Grand Rapids, through its Community Development Department, administers federal funds primarily from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) for housing and community development activities that principally support low- and moderate-income residents and neighborhoods.

Actions and funding priorities related to the federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), HOME Investment Partnerships (HOME), and Emergency Solutions Grants (ESG) programs are identified in the Consolidated Housing and Community Development (HCD) Plan. This five-year strategic plan is also used to guide the Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) program from the U.S. Department of Justice.

Activities identified in the HCD Plan support eight outcomes of the Neighborhood Investment plan, including:

- Prevent and resolve episodes of homelessness
- Improve access to and stability of affordable housing
- Increase the supply of affordable housing
- Improve the condition of existing housing
- Foster engaged, connected, and resident neighborhoods
- Improve community safety
- Improve economic opportunity
- Enhance neighborhood infrastructure

This document summarizes program and project accomplishments for the first year of the FFY 2021 - 2025 Housing and Community Development Plan, covering the period of July 1, 2021 through June 30, 2022. Also included are project accomplishments for investments made through the City's Economic Resiliency and Recovery Investment Strategy (ERRIS) using Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus (CDBG-CV) and Emergency Solutions Grants Coronavirus (ESG-CV) funds.

On March 27, 2020, the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act), Public Law 116-136, was signed, providing CDBG funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic and support low-income families and vulnerable populations. The Act also provided ESG program funds to prevent, prepare for, and respond to COVID-19 among individuals and families who are homeless or receiving homeless assistance and to support additional homeless assistance and prevention activities to mitigate the impact of COVID-19. Federal Fiscal Year (FFY) 2020 CDBG-CV and ESG-CV funds were programmed within the ERRIS framework, comprising three (3) impact areas: Resident Resiliency, Business Resiliency and Recovery, and Community Reactivation.

# NI Plan Outcome 1: Prevent and resolve episodes of homelessness City Strategic Priority: Safe community

Total Expended: FFY 2021: \$671,502

This outcome supports efforts to obtain or retain housing stability for individuals and families experiencing homelessness or at risk of homelessness. Activities include, but are not limited to, homelessness prevention and rapid rehousing.

This outcome supports the development of newly constructed and rehabilitated affordable rental and homeownership units available to low- and moderate-income households. Activities include, but are not limited to, infill new construction; conversion of vacant non-residential buildings to rental housing; rehabilitation and sale of single-family homes for first-time homebuyers; and development of permanent supportive housing for persons with disabilities, the chronically homeless, or other underserved populations.
