



The City of Grand Rapids Public Works Department Recycling Program makes it easy to recycle! Since 2010, Grand Rapids has been a single-stream recycling program. This means that all clean recyclable materials are able to be recycled together in one cart.

Recycling is available to all residents of Grand Rapids. For more information on how to start, stop or change your service and to find the recycling pick up schedule, click on the City of Grand Rapids Public Works link below.

Recycling does not need to be a chore. There are so many ways you can recycle. Donating clothes, reusing plastic bottles and cups, or even turning old materials into new art projects. With recycling the possibilities are endless!



We aim to make sure the environment City's healthy. To do this, we use the latest cutting edge technology for waste, recycling, and street management. We are also committed to making the City of Grand Rapids one of the most sustainable cities in the U.S.

Each recycling cart is made with 40% recycled plastic and the program is available to all residents who have access to public streets.

4 FACTS ABOUT COMPOSTING

Composting Combats Climate Change

Composting is the decomposition of organics by microorganisms that break down the material. This process reduces methane emission and recycles nutrients and carbon back into the soil.

Composting Can Be Done at Home

Home composting is when you use household food waste (such as fruit and vegetable peels) to create compost in your backyard. All you need is a container to collect food scraps in and a designated area to collect, turn and monitor your pile. Remember to keep the area secure so animals do not make a mess of your hard work!

Compost Can Be Used as Fertilizer

After your compost is completed, you can use the nutrient rich soil to fertilize your garden beds and potted plants. No need to go out and purchase soil when you can make it in your own backyard.

Give Scraps a New Life

Did you know that in the United States, food waste is estimated at between 30-40% of the food supply. By composting food scraps, you are creating a new purpose for uneaten food and lessening your impact on landfills.

FEET ON THE STREET 2.0: RECYCLING TRUCK EDUCATIONAL PILOT


The City of Grand Rapids has joined the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE), The Recycling Partnership and Saskatchewan-based Canadian clean tech startup Prairie Robotics to launch a six-month pilot project that uses high-tech cameras, global positioning systems, and computers on 3 city recycling trucks to check the contents of curbside recycling carts for contaminants.

Such items are flagged in real-time, allowing for a personalized postcard or digital notification to be sent to a resident with information about exactly what contaminants were found in the recycling cart and how they can recycle better. The intent of this project is to help change behavior and educate people on what items are acceptable in Grand Rapids recycling carts.

Yard-Waste Resources

As beds are cleaned and trees pruned, residents need to be aware of where to dispose of yard waste:

The City of Grand Rapids offers residents a FREE dropoff site for their yard waste. You can drop-off up to 4
cubic yards each week of leaves, brush, and tree
branches at 2001 Butterworth SW at no out of pocket
cost. This is offered to Grand Rapids residents only, so
bring ID for proof of residence. Yard waste must be
loose or in a paper bag. Plastic bags are not allowed.
People with hydraulic dump-trailers will be required to
manually empty the trailer for safety reasons.


Hours of Operation


<u>April- Mid December:</u> Monday- Saturday 7:30a-4:30p <u>Winter:</u> Monday- Friday 7:30a-4:30p

Curbside yard waste collection operated from Early April until the 2nd Friday in December! Collection is the same day as your regular waste collection.

Where Can Batteries Go?





Batteries DO NOT belong in your trash or recycling curbside carts!

Lithium or other corrosive batteries such as those in: e-cigarettes, vape pens, car batteries and any other lithium-ion batteries should NEVER be put in your curbside trash and recycling carts!

These electronics are not able to be conventionally recycled and have the potential to destroy trucks, machinery and hurt employees.

RECYCLE THESE ITEMS

CLEAN, EMPTY & LOOSE (NOT BAGGED OR BUNDLED)

CARDBOARD & PAPER





GLASS BOTTLES & JARS





MILK, JUICE & SOUP CARTONS







If the cap/lid and container are the same material, keep them attached. If they're different materials, detach and recycle separately.

KEEP OUT OF RECYCLING CONTAINERS!



SEPARATE OUT **RECYCLING TRASH**



No hazardous waste or chemicals: Batteries, electronics, propane tanks, fuel, chemicals, ammunition or other hazardous waste.



No bundled or bagged recycling: Recyclables need to be loose in order to be sorted properly.



Nothing that would tangle: Plastic bags, flexible plastics, string lights, extension cords, clothing, hoses, tarps, hangers, etc.



No foam plastics: Foam take-out containers or cups, blocks of styrofoam, packing peanuts, foam coolers, etc.
